A pelvic exam is a physical examination of your pelvic organs. These include your external genitals, such as the vulva, and your internal organs, such as the vagina, cervix, and uterus.. A pelvic exam is one of many ways to assess your sexual and reproductive health. This exam can be done by an obstetrician-gynecologist (ob-gyn) or other health care professional.

In 2014, the American College of Physicians (ACP) assessed the utility of a screening pelvic examination (defined by the ACP as inspection of the external genitalia; speculum examination of the vagina and cervix; bimanual examination of the adnexa, uterus, ovaries, and bladder; and sometimes rectal or rectovaginal examination) for the detection of cancer (other than cervical), pelvic inflammatory disease, or other benign gynecologic conditions in asymptomatic, nonpregnant adolescent girls ...

A. General Pelvic Preparation . For a transabdominal pelvic sonogram, the patient's bladder can be distended if necessary to displace bowel from the field of view and to provide an optimal acoustic window to better visualize the pelvic structures, particularly if a transvaginal examination cannot be performed.

The pelvic organs include the vagina, uterus, bladder, urethra, and rectum. These organs are held in place by muscles of the pelvic floor. Layers of connective tissue also give support. Pelvic organ prolapse (POP) occurs when tissue and muscles can no longer support the pelvic organs and they drop down.

Pelvic Support Problems | ACOG

If you have frequent or persistent symptoms of ovarian cancer, you may have a physical exam, including a pelvic exam. An imaging test of the ovaries, such as a transvaginal ultrasound exam, may be done. If a growth is found on an ovary, your ob-gyn may order a blood test to measure your CA 125 level. CA 125 sometimes is increased in women with ovarian cancer.

An ovarian cyst is a sac or pouch filled with fluid or other tissue that forms in or on an ovary. Ovarian cysts are very common. They can occur during the childbearing years or after menopause. Most ovarian cysts are benign (not cancer) and go away on their own without treatment. Rarely, a cyst may be malignant (cancer) (see FAQ096 Ovarian Cancer).

Routine pelvic examination should be performed only when indicated by the patient's medical history. For women aged 21 to 29 years, ACOG recommends an annual pelvic examination and cervical cytology.

- The routine pelvic exam has been a usual part of the preventive care for women for decades.
- The exam consists of:
 - Inspection of the external genitalia
 - Speculum examination of the vagina and cervix
 - Bimanual examination
 - Sometimes rectal or rectovaginal examination

A pelvic examination is the physical examination of the external and internal female pelvic organs. It is frequently used in gynecology for the evaluation of symptoms affecting the female reproductive and urinary tract, such as pain, bleeding, discharge, urinary incontinence, or trauma (e.g. sexual assault). It can also be used to assess a patient's anatomy in preparation for procedures.
