Medication assisted treatment (MAT) is a treatment strategy that combines FDA-approved medications, counseling and therapy to help opioid-dependent patients recover and maintain healthy lives. Studies have shown that MAT greatly increases a patient's chance to recover completely from opioid dependency.

Several medications are used in medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorders. 4 The most common medications are listed below. Buprenorphine. Buprenorphine is a partial opioid agonist, which means that it occupies the same receptors in the brain that opioid drugs target. Buprenorphine produces similar but less pronounced opioid effects while preventing withdrawal symptoms.

Medications for addiction treatment (MAT) is the use of medicines such as naltrexone (Vivitrol), buprenorphine (Suboxone, Subutex, Zubsolv, Probuphine) or methadone to help treat opioid addiction, by reducing withdrawal symptoms and cravings and helping to prevent relapse.
