Medication Study Guide - NCDHHS

The medication calculation examination consist of 31 questions for Registered Nurses and 25 questions for Licensed Vocational Nurses of dosage calculations, I.V., and patient rights. You have one (1) hour in which to complete the examination. A score of 80% (25 correct) for Registered Nurses and (20) for Licensed

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Vocational Nurses is required to pass the examination.

Medication Calculation Exam Study Guide and Practice Exam

Instill drops into the center of the lower conjunctival sac. Apply ointment to lower conjunctival sac moving from the inner canthus to the outer canthus.
